Chagall reflects on his impressions of Palestine during his recent trip and mentions the pioneers of Zionism, such as his friend Mier Dizengoff, founder and Mayor of Tel Aviv.

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When I am fifty years of age and not ill, I will not cease to come and celebrate the first pioneers of Zionism for any reason.

In general, my "Zionist" psychism goes back to my recent trip to Palestine. Only the blind and wicked Jews cannot see what is happening there and are insensitive to the country's unusual charm. I don't know if you think that it's easy for me to write words in this way... Many are pronounced in this world, but I cannot stand it, and the words I use to describe my impressions of Palestine can be counted with my fingers. I am not surprised by the skepticism and the tiredness of some Jews with regard to Palestine. I am irritated by the contemptuous smile of the assimilated Jews. It is because they haven't a bit of poetry in their hearts.

If Jews were good at politics we would not have spent two thousand years in ghettos, and Moses would have had a different approach from the beginning. One sole politic has been cultivated among Jews, that of patience... But I also understand the way of thinking of my friend Dizengoff, one of the pioneers of Zionism; as we speak, he works hardly, slowly, but justly on Palestine.
